Sharing and Caring – Malton Friends Meeting House

On 15 July, we shall welcome Friends from Teesdale & Cleveland, Northumbria, and Wensleydale and Swaledale Area Meetings.

These AMs form Quakers in North East England (QuiNEE), the successor body to Durham General Meeting which was laid down in 2009. Friends from these areas meet once a year with the AMs taking it in turns to host a day event. As each AM took on some of the responsibilities of Durham GM, there is no business to transact. Their annual meetings focus on spiritual nourishment with themes of interest to Friends and provide the chance for people to get to know one another.

We hope this will be a chance to get to know Friends in QuiNEE, and to share with them the issues that all or some of our local and area meetings face. We trust Friends will feel able to contribute to this and we shall record some of the proceedings for the future.

2018 Book of Members and Attenders

The preparation of the next Book of Members and Attenders will start this summer with the main compilation being done in the autumn. Quakers in Yorkshire produces this list every three years so the aim is to publish the 2018 Book early next year. It has proved to be a popular source of the names, addresses, telephone numbers and email addresses of Yorkshire Friends.

The style and format has been similar for many editions. It is designed so that the maximum amount of information can be printed on each page. No major changes are planned for the 2018 Book. It will again be produced as only a printed book. This avoids issues of electronic data security. Whitby Burial Ground

The Quaker Burial Ground at Whitby has not been in use for many years. Friends have been able to keep the grass cut but little more. It has become a burden for a meeting with fewer than ten members.

Last year *Whitby in Bloom* contacted the meeting indicating that they would like to develop the site as a quiet garden with fruit trees. They plan to create suitable habitats for wildlife, including bat boxes and insect "hotels", and to get children and young people in the area involved. Pickering and Hull AM have welcomed the project, confirming that the site will remain in Friends' ownership.

Office and community space to rent at Carlton Hill

£31,500 for Quaker adult education in Yorkshire

When QIY received a bequest of £31,500 following the winding up of the Yorkshire Adult Schools Union in 2015, QIY Trustees urged meetings to apply to them for grants. Friends could then make use of Woodbrooke's education programmes, either in Birmingham or by inviting Woodbrooke-on-the-Road into Yorkshire meetings.

Since then we have had useful suggestions that the fund might be opened much more widely – for Quaker adult education at Glenthorne, Swarthmoor Hall or Quaker centres in the south – or for helping fund Kindlers events within Yorkshire. As the money is still available, Trustees will have considered in their June meeting how they can be more proactive in ensuring that Area Meetings are aware of this opportunity and of the fact that we hope to spend the fund within ten years.

We will come to the July meeting of QIY with further thoughts but would also be happy for you to tell us your ideas so that action can begin.

Independent visits to Wolds Way Lavender Farm (entry free), walk in Scampston Hall walled garden and grounds (entry from £4.00) Car required for these visits.


There will also be a small market in the town square.

Malton Meeting House (Greengate, YO17 7EN)Wentworth Street car park: accessible from Princess Road, Wentworth Street and Pasture Lane (3hrs £3, 6hrs £5, thereafter £6).

Limited parking at Meeting House: reserved for blue badge disability holders only.

By rail: Malton is on the York to Scarborough line, 23 minutes from York. Trains leave York at 40 minutes past the hour with an additional service at 09.20. **By bus:** A Coastliner bus 840 runs from Leeds at 07.15, passing through York at 08.22 and arriving at Malton at 09.38 The bus station is opposite the railway station.

From Railway station: 10 minute walk to Meeting House. From station, walk straight up Railway Street towards river and shops. Turn right at T-junction with Yorkersgate, take next left along Wheelgate, continue to Mind shop, right turn into Greengate. (Greengate is also accessible from Old Malton Road.)
