Healing the Wounds of War: A peace memorial exhibition

Geof Sewell tells us that Thirsk Friends plan to commemorate the end of the First World War at Thirsk Museum from October.

Jed Hall, Quaker owner of the now defunct B Smith's Department Store in Thirsk, was decorated by the League of Nations for his humanitarian work after the Armistice. During the Allied blockade of the Central Powers over 700,000 civilians may have died of starvation. In 1919, Quakers received special permission to send food and clothing to mothers and infants. For three years, Hall took lorry loads from Thirsk to Vienna as part of his mission to heal the wounds of war. He befriended the family of Oscar Schindler, hero of *Schindler's List*, bringing two of Oscar's sisters to Thirsk to recuperate. (One attended Thirsk School.) Hall family photos picture the girls with Oscar's father, Hans Schindler, on holiday in Kendal.

After the Treaty of Versailles feeding stations were set up across Germany and Austria. In this *Quakerspeisungen*, American Quakers, led by future President Herbert Hoover, provided meals for over 600,000 every day in Berlin alone. German children were taken to Holland for their health and Jed's sisters, Winifred and Isabel, went out there to help. In *A Quaker Adventure*, Ruth Fry describes the mounting esteem in which Quakers came to be held. Thirsk and York Quaker Minute books also bear this out.

The Nazis gave Quakers enormous latitude. English Friends found jobs and homes for 12,000 refugees in the 1930s. In November 1938 the Home Secretary agreed to plans for the Kindertransport which rescued 11,000 unaccompanied children. A letter in the *Kindertransport Journal* recalls the writer's welcome to Thirsk by Winifred and Isabel Hall when he was a boy. This was part of the Quaker efforts that led to the award of the 1947 Nobel Peace Prize.

Quaker Peace and Reconciliation work continues. Nina Hall, a descendent of Jed's, became Boutros Boutros Ghali's Health Adviser at the UN. In October Thirsk Friends will host talks on the Holy Land conflicts and on war poet Wilfred Owen, killed a week before the Armistice. On Sunday 11 November, there will be a performance of *And the Beat Goes On*. In February 2019, there will be public talks on the Healing the Wounds exhibition.

The Clerk of QiY Trustees, Barbara Windle writes:

July's meeting allows me to say something of Trustees' work over the past year. It's a mixture. On the one hand there's the essential housekeeping: how can banking arrangements be streamlined? What does it mean to accept responsibility for an additional charity? Can we get the relationship between QiY, The Mount School and Bootham School into a clear and compact agreed document?

On the other hand, there's the much broader forward thinking about whether our considerable funds are being put to the best use for the present generation and beyond. If not, what development, what new vision might be possible and appropriate? Under this heading we have two matters in mind. Our Treasurer is working on a scheme to broaden the way the Forrest Meeting Houses Fund is administered. We are also developing proposals for a major change in the application of the Rawdon Educational Fund. Part of our February minute reads:

Were this trust (i.e. the Rawdon Educational Trust Fund) to be created now, we are convinced that Quakers would be not satisfied with a scheme that helped so small a proportion of children of Quaker parents in Yorkshire, especially given the expenses that all parents now face in attempting to support their children in education. We are minded in principle to broaden the objects of the trust and the clerk will speak informally to the three receiving schools straightaway.

I have since spoken with the heads of Ackworth, Bootham and The Mount and I look forward to sharing our thinking with you all in July.

Update on Youth Development Worker

We are very excited to say that Quaker Life, Children and Young People's Team have now appointed the two youth development workers – one for Sheffield and Balby and the rest of Yorkshire, and one working in and around Bristol. They started on 4 June with an induction programme in London - the YDWs are part of the Children and Young People's Team at Friends House and will be managed by them.

Ours, based in Sheffield, is Lee Lester, a Quaker with a background in performing arts and youth work, including peace work and youth projects for young people in rural areas. Lee also coaches for Sheffield United youth football teams, and organises volunteers for them. We are enthusiastically delighted with the appointment.

The under 19s co-ordinating group will meet up with Lee during the induction period, and we look forward to hearing what initial ideas might emerge for young Quakers (age 11-18) in Yorkshire. We have formal input into the project via a reference group that will meet in London, which Guy Milner (Leeds) and Bob Bower (Sheffield) will attend on our behalf. We'll also be part of a local support group which will meet mainly in Sheffield to help Lee with contacts, information and general encouragement for what looks like a very exciting three year project.

Conservation of Yorkshire Quaker Archives

Have you ever wondered how our years of Quaker history are preserved? Leeds University Library holds the Yorkshire Quaker Archives in two large divisions: 'Carlton Hill' (western Yorkshire, broadly from Settle to Brighouse, plus Leeds and Knaresborough); and 'Clifford Street' (York and Thirsk and, most importantly, Yorkshire QM from the 1660s onwards).

Quaker Archive Custodians Group have approached QiY Trustees about financing the provision of storage boxes. These are urgently needed to ensure the security and long-term survival of the material. There is also a shortage of shelf-space in the area where the Quaker archives are stored, but the provision of boxes could help resolve the shelf-space problem!

Direct Action supported by BWYAM

Ian Bray of Brighthouse West Yorkshire AM, with other members of 'Rising Up', carried out four nonviolent direct actions between 19 and 26 March as part of the Stop Killing Londoners, Cut Air Pollution campaign. They were charged with criminal damage and received a conditional discharge and a small fine. The criminal damage was spraying paint on walls.

Ian continues to demonstrate a firm and resolute intention to accept the consequences of his action which comes from his Quaker conviction, 'what does love require of us?' He has carefully thought through all the implications of taking or not taking this action. His support group prayerfully supports Ian in his ministry of nonviolent direct action and holds him in the Light.

About our Speaker

Dr Karen Abi-Ezzi was born in Lebanon and lived there for 10 years. Her father was Lebanese and her mother British. She and her siblings went to Brummana High School in Lebanon. Her interest in Middle East politics is directly linked to her own life and the experience of displacement and loss. She studied at King's College London and the University of Kent and worked for the BBC World Service as she worked on her PhD thesis. She then worked for an NGO focusing on the Middle East through advocacy work and education work. After returning to Lebanon to work on a research project on national reconciliation, she took up her current post in Peace Studies at the University of Bradford in 2002. Her teaching and research focuses on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and she is currently completing a book on the subject, to be published by Routledge in 2019.
