Human Rights and Asylum Housing Action

Sue Beardon of Sheffield and Balby AM tells us that Nether Edge and Sheffield Central Meetings are considering joining the sanctuary meeting network as other Yorkshire meetings have already done. Friends attended a conference that highlighted the concerns about the running of asylum housing by the agencies G4S and Serco. The conference heard about issues emerging from the privatisation of this service and concerns were shared about the handling of the contracts. It was alleged that the system currently offers poor standards of support and maintenance, citing:

- The style of properties used
- Bedroom sharing by strangers
- Harassment
- Lack of accountability and lack of transparency

This is a great chance to discover more about Quaker Faith across the globe, and the work Friends are doing as they follow their leadings and respond to the needs of everyone.

Friends World Committee for Consultation

We are delighted to welcome Simon C Lamb as principal speaker to our meeting at Hull. Simon is an Irish Friend who in his everyday life runs a small factory making various sweet bakery products. Simon comes from and feels a deep affinity with the evangelical unprogrammed tradition of Friends in Ulster Quarterly Meeting. He has been a very active Friend throughout his life in Ireland and internationally. He is an Elder and has worshipped most of his life in Richhill Preparative Meeting.

As clerk of both the European planning committee for the World Gathering of Young Friends in 1985 and the planning committee for the FWCC World Plenary Meeting in Pisac, Peru in 2016, Simon brings a global and a theologically diverse understanding to the work of Friends today. He has more recently become Clerk of Friends World Committee for Consultation. In this capacity in 2017 he travelled in the ministry among Friends in Rwanda and Burundi.

Active in vocal ministry, he has given Yearly Meeting lectures in various parts of the world. He gave the keynote address to the FWCC Triennial in New Hampshire in 2000. Perhaps most importantly Simon longs for Friends globally to rediscover their prophetic voice under the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Quaker World Relations Committee

We shall hear from Liz Scurfield, a member of QWRC, who writes: Our terms of reference are quite simple: Enriching understanding between Friends worldwide and engaging Quakers in Britain in Quaker issues and concerns around the globe (QF&P 9.06, 5th ed.) Summary of Purpose (part): *Quaker World Relations Committee is responsible for maintaining and deepening the relationships of Quakers in Britain with Quakers in other yearly meetings, Friends'*

groupings abroad and with the Friends World Committee for Consultation (FWCC).

Amongst our many responsibilities:

- Sending annual letters of greeting to Europe & Middle East (EMES) Yearly Meetings on behalf of BYM and providing a briefing for BYM representatives to EMES YMs
- Running the QWRC Network, which aims to provide an interactive space where Friends can explore the wider world of Friends and BYM's relationship with it.

We also provide a presence and a welcoming space for international visitors at Britain Yearly Meeting. We invite them to attend BYM and run Special Interest Meetings (SIM). In 2018 we offer on Sat 5 May:

- Melinda Wenner Bradley, Philadelphia YM, on Faith and Play Storytelling (lunchtime)
- Robin Mohr, Executive Secretary of FWCC Section of the Americas; on Travelling in the Ministry: experience from Section of the Americas (evening).

We run the Quaker World Relations Consultative Forum: an annual one-day event for representatives from central and standing committees, Woodbrooke, YFGM, YMAC and CNC, FWCC World Office, FWCC EMES, QCEA and QUNO. It provides a space for knowledge sharing and wider collaborative engagement on a theme of common interest. Last year's theme was: Liberal Quakerism and Movement Building within the Quaker World; this year's is Inter-visitiation: how can we use it to strengthen our community, and our individual faith? Two speakers will provide different perspectives.

QWRC works closely with FWCC World Office and FWCC EMES. I want to highlight an invitation to the 2018 EMES annual meeting in Åsane Folk High School, Bergen, Norway from 21-24 June. There are still open places! The theme is *A New Heaven and a New Earth (Rev. 21:1): Finding new Light in turbulent times*. EMES hopes to provide a programme for children and young people. Alternatives to Violence Project in Namibia

'Thank you... You have really changed my life from no one to someone...'

In 2006 two members of Namibia's Quaker Community wondered how their tiny worshipping group might respond to the increasing violence in the country, in large part a legacy of the colonial period in the region. With funds from Sheffield Central (£1,500) and many individuals, and practical help from Friends at Cape Town Peace Centre and elsewhere in Southern Africa, and in collaboration with the PEACE-Centre in Windhoek, they decided to start an AVP programme in Namibia, now registered with the Ministry of Health and Social Services as 'AVP Namibia'. Since then trained Namibian facilitators have administered the work, with the continuing involvement of local Quakers, one of whom is the AVP Secretary. Much of the work has been in male prisons, as rewarding for the facilitators as for the inmates who have taken part in the courses.

Our connection and on-going support is through our friend, Helen Vale, a member of Namibia Allowed Meeting, known to us since our time in Botswana and Lesotho, and at Southern Africa YMs.

Scholarships for Street Kids (S4SK) – John McConnell

Just over ten years ago, on my way to work in Myanmar, I met a leprosy

mother and her baby begging in a Rangoon street. That night I could not sleep and, by the morning, had decided to do what I could to help them. Thus began the work that led to the formation of Scholarships for Street Kids two years later, and of our sister organisation **Hope for Shining Stars (H4SS)** (now an independent local NGO in Myanmar) three years after that.

Currently H4SS runs around thirty non-formal education classes across Myanmar serving around 400 out-of-school-and-working children. A further 60 children receive scholarships of various sorts ranging from support for children who are moving from non-formal to formal education, vocational training, and some university degree courses.

Our children are all from very poor families, so poor in fact that they have to work to contribute to the family income. It is this economic fact that makes them so difficult to access since their families cannot afford the loss of income incurred by children coming to class for several hours each day. Education alone is not enough: we need to answer the poverty of the families too.

The S4SK-H4SS strategy comprises seven elements:

1. Child-centred, activity-based education. Classes are fun and children enjoy them
2. Payment to families to compensate for the lost earnings of the child. There is no bribery here – just recognition of economic reality
3. Our teachers are also social workers. They visit every home, build trust with parents, and help resolve any problems before they lead to children being withdrawn from class
4. A bursary fund to cover major domestic costs (medical bills, repair of flooded homes etc)
5. Successive educational opportunities, each building on the other
6. Specially trained teachers
7. Advocacy for better provision for out-of-school children.

Catherine Putz, who is a trustee of QCP, along with Margaret Gregory & Paul Simon, visited the Democratic Republic of Congo and Burundi in November 2017. The Congo Partnership is supported by two area meetings in Britain who send money regularly to support community projects based in the village of Abeka on the shore of Lake Tanganyika. Working with the 63 Quaker Churches that form the Communauté des Églises Évangéliques des Amis au Congo (CEEAC), it aims to build peace in communities that are still unstable after many years of civil warfare.

Friends' support helps fund a range of projects: the hospital in Abeka which is gradually improving its facilities; improvements to the water supply to neighbouring villages; CEPAP: Centre for Education, Peace and Psychosocial assistance; a Microcredit scheme for women to develop small businesses and their independence. At the Peace Centre in Uvira NIREC (Initiatives for Community Reconciliation) works in community reconciliation, conflict resolution and peace building, in cooperation with other like-minded organisations.

The QCP/CEEACO partnership has been highly successful in implementing projects to date. The hospital has now a supply of fresh water and a second phase of water supply is recommended, along with solar power, additional equipment; evaluation of the hospital & implementation of recommendations, a training plan, the strengthening of the management structure and a review of the microcredit programme. □Catherine's detailed and fascinating report can be read on the QiY website.



Breaking the Poverty Chain

David Murden has worked for 20 years on sustainable development projects in Ghana and Burkina Faso along Ghana's slave routes. He explains that one of the aims of the NGOs, *And Albert* and *African Lands*, is to open up shipping routes north of the Lake Volta reservoir so that the remote villages on the White Volta River that border on Bukina Faso can gain access to the prosperous southern regions of Kumasi and Accra with all the benefits this would mean for their development.

The creation of this link would enable recipients in Ghana or Europe to access biomass and the best of African crops, fruits, vegetables, and the herbs and plant products that offer health benefits not the least for their own youngsters!

Part of the scheme is the provision of a hospital boat. The proposals have the ear and trust of experienced and qualified personnel who can present surveys and feasibility studies, and of the Chiefs and Elders and, to ease the way, the blessings of entrepreneurial women! All this has been captured on camera and a full-length film is planned, including drone use, to explore and survey each location from Akosombo in the South to beyond Singa village (our main centre) in the North.

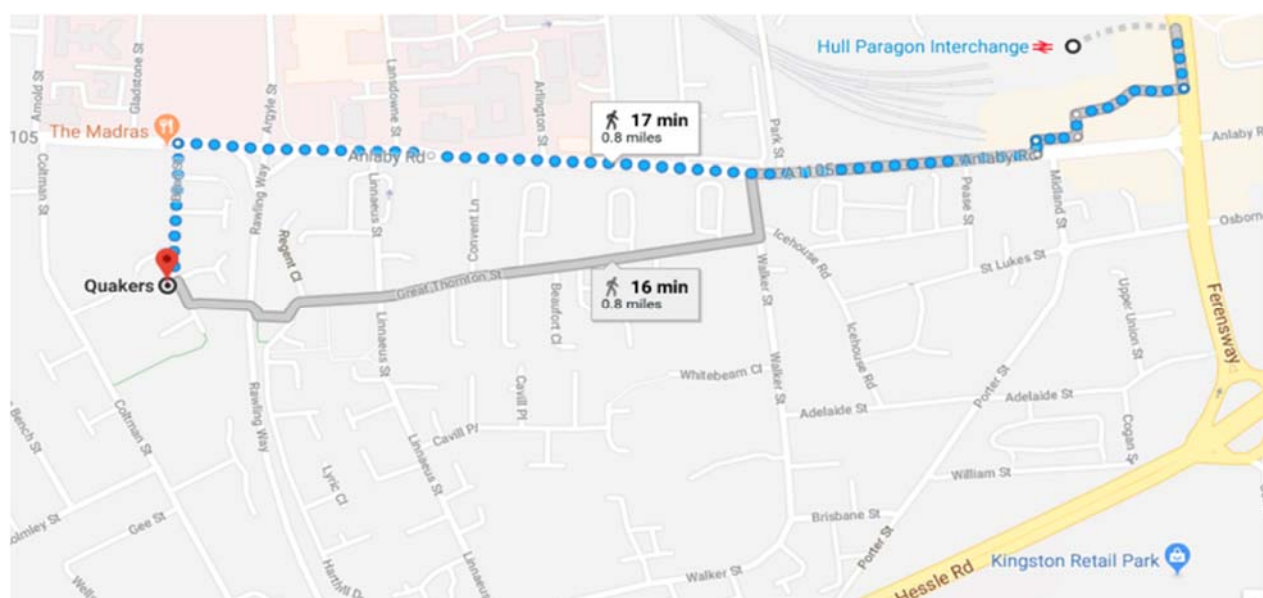
Signing in: Please sign attendance list when you arrive. Name labels available. If you have a badge, please bring it and wear it.

Directions to Meeting House, Bean Street, Hull HU3 2PR

The Meeting House is situated on Bean Street, off Anlaby Road, 100 yards west of the Hull Royal Infirmary traffic light junction.

The building has ramp access and is single storey, with toilet facilities for the disabled and a car park on site.



The buses below serve Hull Royal Infirmary (that's where Friends will need to get off) from Hull Interchange: 1A, 1C, 35, 48, X55, 60/60A, 61, 62, 64/64C, 66, 151, 152, 153, 154, & 155.

If you come by train, it's a good 15-minute walk from the station. To save a little distance, turn right when you leave the platform. Leave by the side, not by the main entrance (as shown on the the map). To avoid traffic fumes on Anlaby Road, turn left when you reach Walker Street, then right on to Great Thornton Street, as shown in grey on the map.
