Funds for Yorkshire youth development worker

Quakers in Yorkshire Trustees are responding to the strong desire, expressed by Friends at the January QiY meeting, to find ways of continuing with the Yorkshire youth work project. They propose to reallocate the Adult School Union funds, about £25,000, for this purpose. The Adult School Union closed in 2015 and the money was given to QiY. A consultation led to it being used to support Friends to attend Woodbrooke courses. However, the take-up has been very low and last year there were no new requests for support. The reason is probably that meetings are able to provide the support needed by Friends to go on Woodbrooke courses. Trustees do not wish to sit on funds which are not being used, so are recommending that the objectives of the Adult School Union fund are changed to support youth work in Yorkshire. This will be on the agenda at the April meeting of Quakers in Yorkshire. David Olver, Keighley

CAAT nominated for Nobel Peace Prize

The American Friends Service Committee (AFSC) has nominated the Campaign Against the Arms Trade alongside their partner Mwatana for Human Rights, a grassroots organisation working in Yemen, for the 2021 Nobel Peace Prize. The nomination from AFSC and Quaker Peace & Social Witness (QPSW) aims to draw attention to CAAT's work to stop the UK government's sales of arms to Saudi Arabia, particularly their ongoing legal challenge to UK arms sales for use in the war in Yemen.

GRASP final report

The Group to Reinvigorate and Simplify Structures and Processes (GRASP) was set up after the QiY meeting at Doncaster in April 2019 when the Recording Clerk enthused Friends with the potential for reinvigoration. GRASP has now published its report with the title "Reinvigoration and Simplification", for consideration by meetings. It contains recommendations aimed at reinvigoration by simplifying the nominations process; how local meetings function; how area meetings work; how AM trustees do business and how to simplify by sharing between meetings. The process of considering the report might seem daunting, but it can be made enjoyable and a means of uniting meetings. Members of GRASP are available to guide if required. The report finishes with a postscript which summarises the objectives:

We hope you will enjoy considering and implementing this report as much as we have enjoyed its preparation. Try to embrace the prospect of change, remembering that help is available and there are practical suggestions in the report. Change is an essential sign that we are alive. Quakers have a way that is quite distinctive in the world. We need to be more widely known and to reverse the current decline in numbers by reinvigorating and diversifying our community. Simpler structures are part of the process of freeing the spirit in our meetings and ourselves.

Dearly beloved Friends, these things we do not lay upon you as a rule or form to walk by, but that all, with the measure of light which is pure and holy, may be guided; and so in the light walking and abiding, these may be fulfilled in the Spirit, not from the letter, for the letter killeth, but the Spirit giveth life.

CENSUS

The UK census takes place on March 21. It is a legal obligation to fill in the census form. Ten years ago the contract for processing the census was awarded to the US arms company Lockheed Martin, leading to quite a lot of protest. *Peace News* reveals that this year's census is once again being processed by an arms company.

'The contract for processing census forms has been put in the hands of Leidos, one of the world's biggest military companies. So far, there hasn't been much debate about this. We'd like to change that. We invite you to take action through the census form itself, to suggest to your friends they do the same. You can take some simple actions to make their job more difficult and this way they will make less profit.'

An Exhibition at Farfield Meeting House, June 2021

Dovetailing is an art installation due to take place at Farfield Quaker Meeting House (by appointment only) in June 2021. The exhibition is inspired by luthiery, the term for the making of stringed musical instruments. Local sculptor Juliet Gutch is creating a series of suspended wooden mobiles which respond to the shapes and forms of musical instruments. Local filmmaker Clare Dearnaley is making a film for the installation weaving together natural sounds, quiet making, the mobile sculptures and played music.

The artists are working with world-renowned composer and viola player Sally Beamish who has specially adapted and performed a composition for the project, 'Prelude and Canon'. The film will also feature Sally's daughter Stephanie Irvine, who is a luthier and who made the viola which Sally plays. The exhibition explores how the quiet care of luthiery dovetails with the natural world to create potential for musical sound.

Dovetailing is a creative response to the evolution of musical instruments as they have evolved over many hundreds of years.

Rhythms, harmonies and timbres of music echo back to the natural world, and it feels as if instruments themselves embody the potential for a balanced and harmonious intertwining of humankind and nature. The title of the project, *Dovetailing*, describes this relationship of two parts by reference to the interlocking dovetail joint in carpentry, a strong and seamless union. This joint is used in the making of instruments and the word has been borrowed for orchestration, describing the technique of overlapping musical lines between two instruments. The exhibition explores music as an expression of a number of interactions - from the tree to the luthier, to the instrument, the composer, the player and the audience. The mobiles will be hung inside Farfield Meeting House with the film projected onto the wall behind them, catching glimpses of the footage of trees, luthiery and performance as they turn.

Following successful fundraising, extensive repairs and decoration have been carried out at Farfield Meeting House. *Dovetailing* is the first event to be held in the restored building.

The exhibition is open Monday 14 June to Sunday 27 June.

Sunday-Wednesday: 10.00 to 16.00, Thursday-Saturday 13.00 to 19.00.

Quaker Tapestry: update for April 2021



Hopes that Quaker Tapestry would stay open throughout this winter were immediately thwarted by the announcement in January of the current lockdown. Museums across the country, despite extensive Covid security arrangements, are now not likely to re-open before 17 May.

The virtual tour and mail-order shop are open now at <u>www.quaker-</u> <u>tapestry.co.uk</u>

Quaker Tapestry looks forward to eventually welcoming back visitors to the museum and members of the nearly 100 groups who have regularly used the building, including special interest societies, counselling and support groups and activities arranged by local authorities, businesses and others. QT and Kendal Local Meeting are installing equipment to facilitate blended meetings in the future.

The response to the "Revive, Survive and Thrive" Appeal has been most encouraging and Quaker Tapestry is very grateful for the support of Meetings, trusts and individuals. The government furlough and rates related grant schemes are also extremely helpful.

Fund-raising is currently focusing on the Roof Appeal, hoping to undertake the delayed works this autumn. One of those once in a century slating and leadwork jobs, the total cost is an estimated £250,000, of which the cost of scaffolding alone is about £50,000. Over two-thirds has been raised already from local Quaker funds, grants and donations.


Eva – Pilgrim on the Way *The memoirs of Eva Irene Pinthus*



Eva Pinthus was a well-known Yorkshire Friend who died in April 2020 aged 95. At 15 she came to the UK on the Kindertransport and in later life she gave unique peace-making service in the GDR (East Germany). Her friends have compiled a memoir 'Eva - A Pilgrim on the Way', using her own words. In 2015 Sheffield Friends formed a Sheffield Quaker history group and surprising things resulted from this.

When in early 2016 Sheffield Friends were informed of some volumes of pictures and writings held by the Sheffield City Archives, the history group was the obvious group to take it further and find out more. There are 40 bound volumes, one for each year the Pen and Pencil Society was in existence. They contain a collection of poems, photos, paintings, drawings and writings, written and illustrated by a group of Sheffield Quakers covering 40 years around the turn of the 19/20th century. The writings cover a variety of subjects such as Solving the problem of dividing York Quarterly Meeting, Women's rights, and Notes on the Natural History of a chameleon.
