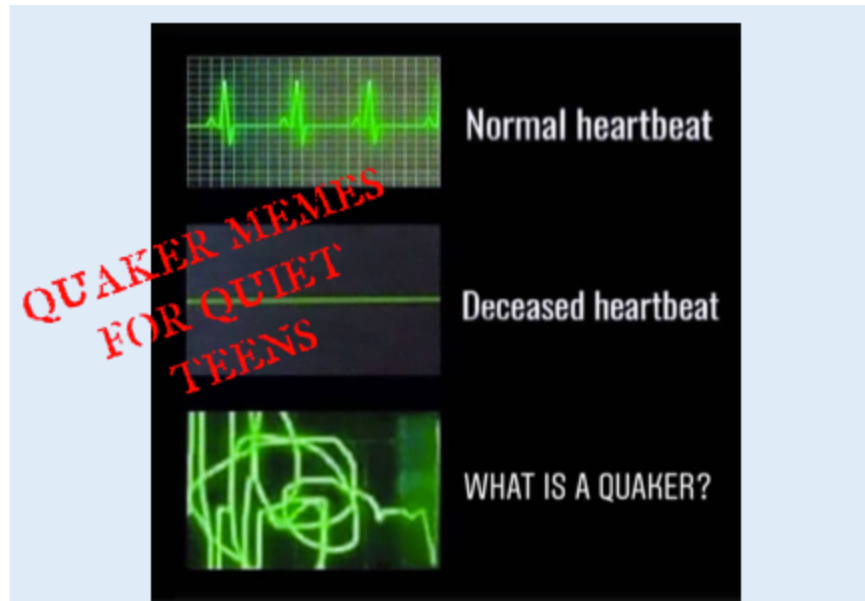

Mr Harrigan's Prince and the price of vengeance.

Stephen King's spooky short story about a billionaire and the young man he pays to read literary classics, has recently been taken up by Mattia and adapted into an excellent film. Like so much of Stephen King's work, you are forever trying to work out if a character is a goodie, or a badie, only to find that they are neither. All the characters in *Mr Harrigan's Prince* follow this middle-ground pattern.

Harrigan himself is known to be cold, unemotional and ruthless. When asked by his young reader employee, Craig, how Harrigan dealt with the bullies of his past, Harrigan's one word answer reverberates with violence and malice:

Heavily.

However, Harrigan's clear regard for Craig and his welfare redempt him in the eye of the audience, and certainly in Craig's eyes.

Craig's own bully, Yankovic, gets exposed and in the scene where he and Craig fight after the latter has been expelled from school, we see Harrigan's influence over the scene and inevitability of revenge. Yankovic, almost in tears, slams Craig against a wall.

"Why did you have to do that man, now I have to kick your ass."

Yankovic's violence is an inevitable part of the life he's chosen, and an inevitable consequence of him being (supposedly) informed on by Craig. The line has so much weight and foreboding that you almost know the twist of the film before it happens! But the twist does come, and with it Craig's shadowy, vengeance-fueled power. Lessons on sorrow, rage and justice learned from Yankovic and Harrigan are put into swift action. Craig's rage flares for a moment, and that moment defines in his life for ever after, in ways that he can never escape from and will always regret.

We find that in Craig's episode, even the unseen, unliving beast of vengeance brings to the fore its unbridled power, seeing the damage that it wreaks, it seems to me that in so doing Craig makes a very Quakerly point.

The entire Quakers recognized the self-perpetuating nature of revenge, and what was to be expected as English Quaker settled. They wanted no part of it.

"We do sorry *deary* all outward wars and strife and fighting with outward weapons. His is our testimony to the whole world," Quaker Declaration to Charles II.

Friends, are there places in our lives where we need to free ourselves of a vengeful violent cycle?

Testimony Focus, China.

Simply put, Xi Jinping has just been reaffirmed as the leader of the Chinese Communist Party for a historic third term. The CCP had previously made rules to prevent leaders being re-elected. However, Xi Jinping has been re-elected for a third term, a move that has surprised many. Many have seen this as a sign of the party's strength and ultimate power in a country, through history we have seen leaders who have tried to alter what others think. Sustainability: Sometimes a picture paints a thousand words.

Truth and Integrity: Bloomberg report that the Chinese government requested the social media giant, TikTok, permission to operate in at least one (likely many more) account with the express intent of providing Chinese communist propaganda (and messages to the Chinese government) to the American public. Xi Jinping has been re-elected for a third term, a move that has surprised many. Many have seen this as a sign of the party's strength and ultimate power in a country, through history we have seen leaders who have tried to alter what others think. Throughout history we have seen leaders who have tried to change the course of a nation, to bring about a new era of peace, prosperity and growth.

Western audience: We know from Russian interference in both the US presidential elections and the Brexit referendum that truth and integrity is not at all high on the list of propaganda's priorities.

Funding of Quakers in Yorkshire in 2023

The income needed to fund the activities of Quakers in Yorkshire comes from the combination of contributions from Area Meetings; charges for events; grants and donations. Over the last two years, the pandemic and lockdowns have led to reduced income from grants and

QiY Trustees are aware of the strain on the finances of area meetings so have decided that in future we will divide our costs into core costs and support costs. The core costs will be contributed by Area Meetings on a per member basis. The support costs will be obtained by appealing for donations from Friends and meetings.

The core costs are those arising from running the QiY charity – the cost of holding Quarterly Meetings, insurance, safeguarding, newsletter, website, subscriptions, bank charges. The support costs are those arising from the activities which QiY oversees for the benefit of all Friends in Yorkshire - the Outreach Project system, Junior Holidays, Yorkshire Friends Holiday School, and Easter Settlement. The latter three activities charge fees but there is usually a subsidy from QiY to cover bursary and administration.
