I will be continuing Bridget's peer-support sessions for Meeting role-holders (you can sign up for these on the Quakers in Yorkshire website). I am also available to respond to any questions or challenges that your Meeting is having, or to support new initiatives and leadings.

- Working with and supporting Friends working under a concern that relates to children, youth and families.

We both hope that you will reach out to us so that we can support you and your communities to be exciting, vibrant places of deep peace.

A note on using QR codes;
